Social Stories Book “ Now I Get It”

This book teaches children to effectively deal with social situations. Two great stories are contained in this book. “I don’t understand” and “Getting Help, Giving Help”.

Visually demonstrates appropriate behaviour in real life situations. This book is perfect for children who:

- Aren’t always sure what people are saying
- Need to learn how to ask for clarification
- Learning how to effectively ask for help
- Need to learn when they should help others

Contains comprehension questions at the end of each story to ensure that “CHILDREN GET IT!”

40 Photo Card Question Set

This photo card question set teaches children to answer “How” and “What” questions with ease.

This fun set teaches children:

- To label & identify actions
- To answer “What” questions
- To answer three step “How” questions

Beginner, Intermediate and Advanced levels.

40 Photo Card Questions Series In the Home

This photo card series is excellent for teaching children question comprehension and teaches children to answer questions about all the things we do at home. Students will understand and answer all the “WH” questions. “WHAT”, “WHEN”, “WHERE”, “WHY” AND “WHO”.

84 Photo Cards - Abstract Categories

This set teaches abstract thinking and sorting by category. Children learn that although items may be different they still have a common base. A child may be able to name concrete categories such as animals, shapes, or colors. However abstract categories such as things that are noisy, things you find at birthday parties or things that have bristles are equally important for understanding the world around us.

Conversations Starters

These two sided flips cards helps teach a child how to engage in an appropriate conversation. Six different topics. Examples include movies, play, sport, computer games, books and TV. Each card has a question on the front. Flip it over and the beginning of the answer is on the back. The conversation starters employ two stages for teaching. The first stage teaches children to spontaneously answer questions while the second stage teaches children to inquire about other people and to initiate conversations.
